### **LIVE FROM ITALY!**

THURSDAY 5:00PM OCT 7 2021 | SHORT FILMS

Our 2021 Festival opens with the world premiere of **Precollinear Park: A Placemaking Experience**, a short film about the revitalization of Precollinear Park in Turin, Italy. The premier will be followed by a live presentation from our partners at *Urban Stratosferica* (an urbanism festival taking place concurrently in Italy from October 7-10th) and local expert discussants.

Following the live presentation, we will conclude with a short series of films about the intersection of street art and placemaking. We head to Rome where a rogue street artist carves dead tree stumps into beautiful sculptures. Then we continue to exercise our creative remagining of space with shapes and movement. Forms explores the shapes of spaces, while Moving Barcelona uses dance to reorient our sense of space and place. Disco introduces us to a street performer who connects his community. Lastly, we'll see how street art in Juárez, Mexico, is pleading for justice.

In Bihar, "Sarkar mera bada bhai hai" (the government is my older brother) is the righteous response to why one may illegally acquire electricity connections. A team of academics work on the ground to activate RLSS (Revenue Linked Supply Scheme) and are met with various degrees of opposition and success. The film explores the complex relationships people have with the State through the lens of electricity. Is electricity a right? Or is it a commodity? In a country with limited resources, can it be a social right if the government needs funds to keep the grid functional? And if so, can the normalization of non-payment of bills be reversed? Is it possible to create an ideal citizenry?

## I AM YOUR DENSITY: LOVE LETTERS TO URBAN PLANNING & DESIGN

THURSDAY 7:00PM OCT 7 2021 | SHORT FILMS

It is said that we shape our cities and then our cities shape us. We've curated this series of short films to show the power of community to shape the urban design process. We begin in Dublin where a community-centered design process led to area youth becoming more invested in public parks. A new library in a small town gives the community a new reflection of their place. A student film uses stop motion animation to explain the effects of pollution on cities. In Durban, South Africa we see two projects making improvements in the city through new services. And in Brazil, a creative team hosts an intermodal challenge to cross the busiest metro area via car, walking, transit, and biking. Walk the BLVD shows how one community in LA is recruiting more voices of color in the design process. In Ottawa, garden suite apartments are helping move more people into the city. Back in Dublin, an increase in bars and clubs saves The Temple Bar neighborhood, but some worry the snake is eating its tail as too many bars begin to displace other neighborhood amenities. Finally, in D.C. green solar projects become creative opportunities to address issues of equity and gentrification.


## THE TWELVE


### **MENDING WALLS**

## UNLIKELY ENVIRONMENTAL HEROES: HOW CITIES CAN SAVE THE PLANET

THURSDAY 9:00PM OCT 7 2021 I SHORT FILMS

Urbanists agree that cities are humankind's greatest invention, but could they also be our greatest "Green" invention? This series of short films shows how the city can save the planet. In the film Vaka, Tokelauan people must weave traditional culture with new science in order to make their entire island completely net zero and save the coral which is their livelihood. Next, two films explore farming initiatives in Durban and Brisbane that are reconnecting urban dwellers with their food supply chain. Next, saving the planet becomes an epic battle in a student's



stop motion animation. Garden suite homes are reducing the carbon footprint of city residential populations. Beekeepers in the heart of London are keeping the whole world pollinated. *Sounding the Alarm* explores the lives of people on the frontline of climate change. *Muzzi Bikes* profiles an eco-friendly way to manufacture bicycles, which are arguably the most eco-friendly form of transit. Lastly, *ZIP Code Matters* explores how cities have failed some residents and how they can improve.

Garden suites offer autonomy and security for a son with special needs. In Los

Angeles additional obstacles to bicycling, like race and class, need to be addressed other than just infrastructure. In Lakota in America, we see how community programs can address generational trauma. Lastly, in Seattle, we see how one church embraces the community through powerful introspection about their own role in gentrification.


### THE NEXT DETROIT





## THE PLACE THAT MAKES US

When the steel mills shut down in Youngstown, Ohio, it shattered a way of life. Over half the population left. Thousands of empty blighted homes were left behind, eroding the social fabric of this once mighty industrial base. Like many post industrial towns, persistent joblessness, crime and poverty plague the city.

Filmed over the course of 2 1/2 years, this film follows the lives of a new generation of residents who have grown up in a world of post-industrial decline. Unlike their parents' generation, haunted and traumatized by watching their way of life crumble around them, this generation is able to envision a new future, and they are working to make a life for themselves in their hometown.

This film is an inspiring testimony to the modest but profound resilience and dedication it takes to transform a community. A crucial story to be heard at a time of extreme inequality, divisiveness, upheaval and uncertainty, The Place That Makes Us is a meditation on the meaning of home in America today.
